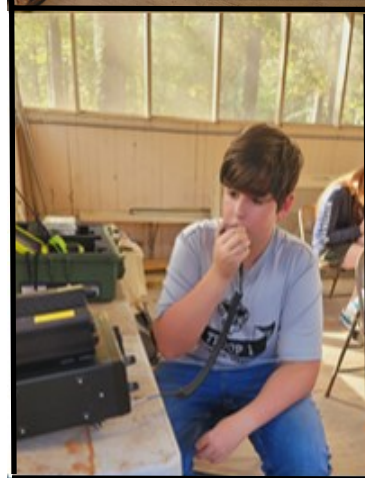
### Jamboree-on-the-Air (JOTA)

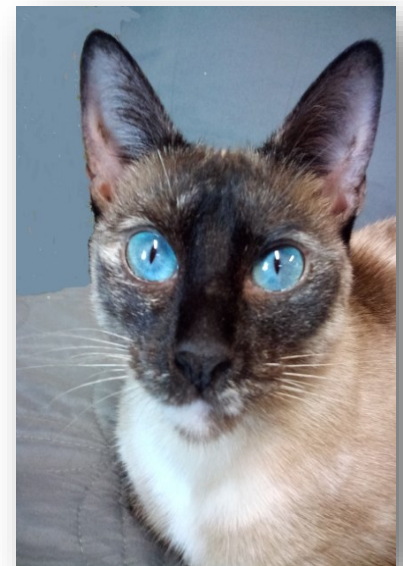


## Happy Anniversary “Bella”!

## Don't Forget Clear Channel AM Stations

**AM 540 600 700 900 1050 1150 1200 1390 1600 KHz**

A valuable source of information for Amateur Radio Operators--and everyone else--during national emergencies is our National Clear Channel AM broadcast network. Early on, these 50,000 watt AM stations were granted protection from interference--mostly at night--so that rural America could receive broadcasts. Later it was recognized that these stations could have an important role as part of the Emergency Broadcast Network to help spread information from the government to the population. While emergency alerts would inform you about what is going on, listening to a Clear Channel AM station is highly beneficial as it would help you to understand *what* to do as the emergency progressed. The list provided here suggests many stations that could be of interest during an emergency. The local stations provide evacuation information and simulcast frequencies for local TV stations. And, yes, the LSU and ULL football networks are of the utmost importance!

The Clear Channel AM listing has stations within 600 and 1000 mile radii from Lafayette. Those within the 600 mile radius are reliably heard on most nights and are clear enough to understand. Whereas, those within the 1000 mile radius are more difficult to understand, sometimes fading often. These stations are indicated on the map. I have not had reliable results beyond 1000 miles with a small portable radio such as the [Eton Elite Executive](#) or [Grundig Satellit 500](#) with the built-in AM antennas.

There are many more Clear Channel stations but years of listening has allowed me to put together this map. What you hear on these stations may provide you with a valuable perspective and insight on any developing national emergency and this could aid your emergency communications effort.

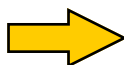
